

[Rabbi] **Nimon Says:**

Another year has flown by. Before you know it, we will all be in synagogue asking God to bless us in the year ahead, and seeking forgiveness for not living at our best in the year gone by.



Please keep in mind that the *Yamim Noraim* (the Days of Awe), the period from *Rosh Hashanah* to *Yom Kippur*, is considered a time for confessing our sins against the Source of all Life. The High Holy Days are not considered effective in atoning for transgressions against people. I write, “people” and not “others” deliberately because at times some of our most egregious sins are committed against ourselves. We know better and still choose to act in a less than God-like manner. We show anger inappropriately, we gossip, we hold grudges. We, who are commanded to be an *am kadosh*, a holy people, are all too capable of falling short of achieving that level of behavior.

The month that precedes Rosh Hashanah, *Elul*, is given to us as a time for doing “*selihot*”, seeking forgiveness from people that we have wronged. Please use the remaining time between now and *Rosh Hashanah* to really examine your life. If there are others who you need to approach for forgiveness, do it now. If others approach you, try not to hold on to anger and resentment. Those feelings only diminish the person who carries them around. If you have done anything to yourself that has diminished your own self worth, keep in mind the biblical teaching that all humanity was created “in the image of God” - Gen. 1:27).

We are all holy and it is crucial that we try live up to that standard.

Our tradition teaches us that *mitzvah goreret mitvah, averah gorerat averah* - one good deed will bring another good deed, one transgression will bring another” (Mishnah, in Pirkei Avot 4:2). We constantly are changing. If we are not careful it can be for the worse, but an examined life can lead to improvement.

Time is always passing. This time of year we are even more conscious of it. May we make the most of our days so that, in the words of the Psalmist, “we can obtain a heart of wisdom.” (Psalm 90:12)

Lisa joins me in wishing all of you a *Shannah tovah u'metukah*, a happy and sweet new year.

Who Knows Six? We know Six. Six are the sections of:

The Mishnah.

Perhaps you will recognize the words above as coming from one of the last songs we sing at our Passover seder, but what is the Mishnah? The Mishnah was a revolutionary book compiled by Rabbi Judah the Prince around 200 C.E. The Rabbis of that time maintained that Moses received two revelations at Sinai; the written Torah and an oral explanation that explained many of the details of the Five Books of Moses. The Torah itself had clear and unambiguous reference to not adding to the Torah, but R. Judah took the bold step of codifying the Oral Law. Discussions of the Mishnah took place for hundreds of years and eventually the Mishnah with those discussions became written down in the Talmud.

Rabbi Nimon will be teaching a course on the Mishnah every other Tuesday evening beginning October 16th. Attendees will be required to pay a materials fee of \$ 18.00. Please contact Rabbi Nimon if you are interested in this class. Pre-registration is required so that the texts can be pre-ordered. The class will run for approximately ten sessions.

Meditation Exercises to be Offered by Dr. Av Szyller


Dr. Szyller will be leading sessions in meditation at his home in Covington. In a setting that overlooks woods and a river and situated near ponds and beautiful gardens, Av will help people learn about and experience meditation.

Meditation is mentioned in the Torah. In the first book of the Five Books of Moses, Genesis, we read that "Isaac went out to meditate in the field at the evening time..." (Gen 24:63). In the 19th century of the common era, Rabbi Israel Salanter, founder of the Musar (Ethical) Movement suggested that meditation could help to improve moral character. The sessions will be free for members of the NJC family.

These sessions will be held starting in October on a date and at a time that will be announced in the future.

Adult Education Introduction to Kabbalah

To start on Tuesday, Oct. 16th



One of our members, Ms. Josh Rosenthal, has studied The Kabbalah for close to two decades. She has graciously offered to share with us some of the many insights that she has gained in her readings. Josh will teach us how God, HASHEM, (a way of referring to God's name, and meaning "The Name") directs our lives. HASHEM has given us the instruction of how to lead a moral life that will reflect the HOLINESS that is HASHEM. She has observed that all too often we engage in pettiness and forget the importance of "loving our neighbors as ourselves." (Liv.19:18)

Josh will be using a short summary of the weekly Torah portion that explains the material consistent with and based on classic teachings of the Kabbalah. No background is necessary. Just come with an open mind.


The Kabbalah is part of Chasidic Judaism but it is also studied and appreciated by the non-Chasidic world. The sessions will not be going very deep into the subject so no one will be overwhelmed. Those in attendance will get a feel for a spiritual and ethical approach to the Jewish tradition. The class will meet initially on Tuesday, October 16th in the NJC Library. It will meet on the same days as Rabbi Nimon's Mishnah class.



Is there Life after Death?

What do Jews believe about the world to come? Does it exist? Will we all get there or is it reserved for only a few select souls? Do we believe in the concept of hell? What does Judaism have to say about reincarnation? Why do we bury our dead so quickly? Why does traditional Judaism not allow cremation? What do liberal Jews think about it? What's in a Name?

Here's a discussion from Jim Klein

Northshore Jewish Congregation. What's in a name? NJC, as a name, refers to a geographical location that distinguishes it from the South shore. Is this what we want - to identify our location in reference to the South shore or do we want a name that helps anchor us to our core values (God, Israel, Peace) and to the life of our .

Over the last couple of years we have struggled with our financial future and slow decline in membership. I am optimistic of a promising future for our synagogue. I recently read about one of the first Reform synagogues in the United States - Congregation Kahal Kadosh Beth Elohim in Charleston (1750). In 1904 Beth Elohim was founded in Georgetown, S.C., and named after Beth Elohim in Charleston. Beth Elohim started much as we did with a part-time rabbi and student rabbis. Over the years the membership dwindled to five people. In anticipation of its closure one of the two Torah scrolls were sold. Through a rededication of its leaders the congregation grew and survives today as a viable synagogue.

Perhaps a name like Beth Elohim would fit us. I would like to know more about the history of how we decided on NJC - I suspect it just fit at the time - but does it fit today? I believe that we need to establish our identity for now and for the future. For those who have a difficult time in breaking away from NJC as a name, perhaps we can have a Hebrew name associated with NJC. For example, Beth Elohim, The Northshore Jewish Congregation. Our letterhead would read:

The Northshore Jewish Congregation

Note: I simply like Beth Elohim as a synagogue name and only offer it up as one possibility for consideration.

A Message from Hebrew School Director...Roberta Torman

We are excited to start a new Hebrew school curriculum called Mitkadem. Mitkadem is a Hebrew prayer and ritual program that allows students to feel they are able to learn and be successful, no matter what their level of ability. Highly motivated and adept students speed ahead as they discover just how engaging and meaningful the study of Hebrew and prayer can be. Teachers quickly identify those students who, due to absences or learning issues, need special help. One-on-one attention and individually designed programs can accommodate these students as they continue to work productively alongside their classmates.

These are the possibilities of the self-paced Mitkadem program. The work of the teacher is not a traditional one. While frontal, whole-group lessons can close a class session or occasionally replace a Mitkadem session. The self-paced classroom requires the teacher to be a facilitator of individual learning. He/she is the nucleus of the classroom, setting up a functional system for working, keeping students on track, and addressing individual needs.



Ushers and
Hagbah and Gelilah Honorees**

Would you like to blow a shofar at our services on Rosh Hashanah and at the conclusion of our service on Yom Kippur? As has become our tradition in our NJC family, we are planning on having a number of different people sound the shofar so that we can fulfill the mitzvah of hearing its special sounds. This year, on the last Sunday of August, many of us had the opportunity of making our own shofars. If you did, or if you already own a shofar, this workshop will help get you ready to properly produce the *kol shofar* – the voice of the shofar.

If you are interested in participating, come to a session with Rabbi Nimon **on Tuesday, September 11th at 7:00 P.M.** **Bring your shofar if you have one.** Rabbi Nimon owns one that he can lend to someone. Call Rabbi Nimon to make an individual appointment if you are interested in participating but cannot make the meeting on that Tuesday.

On the same day, **Tuesday, September 11th at 7:30 P.M.** there will be a **brief training session for anyone ushering** on the High Holy Days. We will go over the responsibilities of being an usher. The meeting should take no more than 30 minutes.

When that concludes **at 8:00 P.M.** **anyone who receives an honor of Hagbah (raising the Torah) or Gelilah (dressing the Torah) can practice** so that s/he can be comfortable doing this during services. If you would just like the experience of performing Hagbah or Gelilah in a practice situation, even if you have not received that honor this year, please feel free to attend. Please note: The ritual committee reminds everyone that for this honor you are encouraged to wear a *tallit*.
